1 ***** BEGINNING OF RECORDING *****

2 MS. SHOMO: Today is Thursday, April 28th,
3 2011. I am Aubrey Ellen Shomo about to meet with Dan
4 Shearer. It is just after 1:50 -- that's 1350 --
5 p.m., Fort Collins and Denver local time.

6 And I am currently in the restroom of the
7 Safeway across the street from Dan's office at 503
8 Remington Street, where I'm about to speak to him.
9 I'm intentionally wearing a wire for this interaction.

10 As a result of that fact, many of the things
11 I say, especially early in the conversation, will be
12 designed to elicit his sense of his good reasons and
13 how anyone else would have done the same thing he had
14 done and many of the other standard police tactics for
15 securing a confession.

16 As such, for instance, if I say that I am
17 really quite mentally ill and paranoid to Dan, that
18 should not be taken as a statement of my belief but,
19 rather, a statement of what Dan needs to be told in
20 order to be willing to openly discuss what he did.

21 I am hoping that he admits to an
22 impropriety, but we will have to wait and see what the
23 future holds.

24 I have two tape-recorders going because I
25 seriously doubt Dan will ever authenticate the

1 validity of the recording. So these recorders will
2 independently tape the call. Hopefully that's some
3 cross-checking on the evidence -- or not call rather.
4 It's a physical meeting.

5 I've already wasted almost two minutes. Let
6 me get the electrical tape going and get myself wired
7 up.

8 The device I'm currently speaking into
9 loudly, which will be making a stereo recording, is an
10 Olympus digital voice recorder, WS210S, as in --
11 that's Whiskey Sierra 210 Sierra. I will refer to
12 this device as "Recording Device Alpha." It will be
13 taped to my chest under my shirt.

14 The device which you're now hearing clearly,
15 quite unlike the other, is an Olympus digital voice
16 recorder VN -- that's Victor, November -- 6200 Papa
17 Charlie. This will be located in my bag.

18 (Long pause in recording.)

19 (Indistinguishable remarks made.)

20 MS. SHOMO: I know standard wire procedure
21 would have me tape this to my bare chest, but this
22 will be quite fine.

23 So, again, for the benefit of both
24 recorders, Whiskey Sierra 210 Sierra is Recorder
25 Alpha. Victor November 6200 Papa Charlie is Recorder

1 Bravo. Recorder Alpha will be taped to my chest.

2 Recorder Bravo will be in my bag.

3 (Long pause in recording.)

4 (Indistinguishable remarks made.)

5 MS. SHOMO: I'm ready. I'm nervous, though,
6 so we'll have a little ritual, and then I will be off
7 to the meeting. Right on time, too.

8 I must not fear. Fear is the mind-killer.
9 Fear is the little death that brings total
10 obliteration. I will face my fear. I will permit it
11 to pass over me and through me. And when it has gone,
12 I will turn the inner eye to see its path. Where the
13 fear has gone there will be nothing. Only I will
14 remain.

15 I believe I'm ready.

16 (Long pause in recording.)

17 MR. SHEARER: Aubrey.

18 MS. SHOMO: Hello.

19 MR. SHEARER: Good to see you. Come on
20 down.

21 MS. SHOMO: Likewise.

22 MR. SHEARER: It's been -- let's see. I'm
23 trying to think. Is it five or six years?

24 MS. SHOMO: It's been quite some time. How
25 have things been in your world?

1 MR. SHEARER: Oh, they've been pretty good.
2 Really good. What about yourself? It's been, I don't
3 know, since you were at Vic's, I believe. I was still
4 a resident, I believe, of Boulder. And then I got --
5 well, I got a great job with Poudre Valley Hospital,
6 and then they forced my hand to open up a private
7 practice, and that thing exploded.

8 So, yeah, unlike Boulder, Fort Collins has
9 been very, very good to me.

10 MS. SHOMO: Hmmm.

11 MR. SHEARER: So, yeah, it wasn't a
12 user-friendly place, the mental health center, those
13 people. But, hey, I'm in a better place.

14 And then there's you.

15 MS. SHOMO: Then there's me.

16 MR. SHEARER: What about you?

17 MS. SHOMO: Well, I completed half of my
18 bachelor's degree after I got tired of corporate
19 world.

20 MR. SHEARER: Oh, okay. What are you going
21 after in the bachelor world?

22 MS. SHOMO: Western classics, actually.

23 MR. SHEARER: Western. Amazing. Wow. You
24 don't mind if I write a few notes and stuff like that.

25 MS. SHOMO: By all means. Write down

1 whatever you wish.

2 MR. SHEARER: All right. I've been noticing
3 that if I don't write it down, I usually have a
4 tendency to forget. I've got quite the caseload these
5 days. And I always had resentment towards those
6 people that would write notes. You know what I mean?

7 MS. SHOMO: Well, are you working with
8 lighter cases now? Or are you still working in like
9 the heavy-duty stuff like you were before?

10 MR. SHEARER: Well, a little bit of both.
11 Because in the hospital, obviously, those are critical
12 cases because they end up hospitalized, much like --
13 well, there was a time you ended up in one, that I
14 recall.

15 So kind of the same kind of situation.
16 Adolescent hospital -- well, there's an adult and an
17 adolescent unit. It's called Mountain Crest Hospital.
18 It's on the other side of town.

19 MS. SHOMO: Do you mind if I relocate to
20 make more efficient use of your pillows?

21 MR. SHEARER: Please do so. And if you
22 would like, this chair -- people seem to also like
23 that chair, as well, so . . .

24 And then the rest of the caseload here in my
25 private practice, adolescents, of course, and most of

1 them with drug problems. Because I'm a licensed
2 family therapist, I work with the families, as well.

3 MS. SHOMO: And you're also a licensed
4 social worker, correct?

5 MR. SHEARER: A licensed marriage and family
6 therapist.

7 MS. SHOMO: Oh. So you just have the
8 master's in social work. But --

9 MR. SHEARER: Actually, no. I got a
10 master's -- a bachelor's in psychology and a master's
11 in counseling.

12 MS. SHOMO: I see.

13 MR. SHEARER: And then I got licensed in
14 California. Then came out here to Colorado. And they
15 just said, please throw us some money, and I got
16 licensed here. It was -- yeah. It was -- you didn't
17 have to do anything.

18 MS. SHOMO: No. Once you have got the first
19 state, it's easier to get the subsequent ones.

20 MR. SHEARER: It depends on the state, too.

21 MS. SHOMO: True enough.

22 MR. SHEARER: California and New York pretty
23 much set the precedent. Everybody else just says,
24 throw us some money.

25 MS. SHOMO: Well, I mean, in fact, that's

1 pretty much what my problem is, is that I'm seriously
2 considering going into human rights law. But that's
3 one of the few things where they can get access to
4 just about anything they damn well please.

5 MR. SHEARER: In terms of a law degree or --

6 MS. SHOMO: In terms of an actual license
7 before the bar.

8 MR. SHEARER: They can go after your
9 adolescent records?

10 MS. SHOMO: Yes, they can. In fact, in many
11 states, you are required to disclose even expunged
12 records. And, of course, there's the U.S. Supreme
13 Court case, "Dickerson v. New Banner," which dates all
14 the way back from 1983, which set up a doctrine which
15 establishes that a deferred judgment, because it's
16 based on a guilty plea, may not be a conviction since
17 it has no judgment of conviction, but where the word
18 "conviction" appears plainly in a federal statute, the
19 going interpretation of that word is that a deferred
20 judgment is a conviction.

21 And what makes it worse is that different
22 states have different opinions on that. The U.S.
23 Supreme Court decision, Congress immediately responded
24 to and passed a law to fix. But the decision is still
25 considered binding case law.

1 It's one of those bizarre catch-22s that can
2 only happen in a legal system so complicated almost no
3 one can fit the entire thing in their head.

4 MR. SHEARER: Yeah. And already my head is
5 oozing out stuff. So -- well, you know, you, of all
6 people, are rather versed and intelligent. And so if
7 you found something that's going to be in your way, I
8 would imagine it's going to be in your way.

9 Now, let's recall -- I don't recall you
10 getting convicted for anything. So remind me what
11 happened here, because --

12 MS. SHOMO: Well, I was going to actually
13 ask that question the other way, because, I mean,
14 Governor Ritter set the precedent of being able to
15 pardon a deferred judgment, even a successfully
16 completed and dismissed one, on his way out the door,
17 because, of course, you know, lame duck is when these
18 things happen.

19 MR. SHEARER: Right.

20 MS. SHOMO: But that does mean that it is
21 possible, even when there's no conviction -- there's
22 just a guilty plea -- to pardon the case.

23 MR. SHEARER: Yet, when you were in that
24 prime age between 16 and 17 -- or 14, you know, when I
25 came around, I mean, granted, yes, there was conflict

1 with you and mom. Yes, there was altercations. You
2 ended up hospitalized one time.

3 But are you saying mom -- and I'm assuming
4 mom, on numerous occasions, must have called the
5 police.

6 MS. SHOMO: Well, and that's actually -- I
7 was hoping you had a better memory. I do have some of
8 your actual notes on me that I can look at.

9 But I was actually hoping that you might be
10 able to refresh my memory a bit, because the other
11 thing I'm asked to do --

12 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

13 MS. SHOMO: -- is give a factual accounting
14 of the case and what happened and all of that in my
15 pardon application. And I'm sure you're aware, I was
16 pretty paranoid back then.

17 So I was hoping the information flow could
18 go the other way. I was hoping you had some
19 recollection of all of that.

20 MR. SHEARER: Well, give me some time here.
21 Okay? I'm processing, as we speak.

22 First thing's first, though: It's my
23 recollection you were never arrested. Am I not
24 accurate?

25 MS. SHOMO: Well, don't you remember being

1 on the phone with me on September the 12th, 2001, when
2 I told you I didn't want to enter the plea, even
3 though -- I mean, you're the one who drove me to the
4 D.A. Remember, you drove me to the prosecutor twice?

5 That wasn't me. And the first time I walked
6 out? And the second time, you know, you explained to
7 me what was in my best interest. And I think you were
8 absolutely correct, that it was absolutely necessary
9 that I gave in, because, you know --

10 MR. SHEARER: Because if I did say that,
11 which I would see that that would be me, it's
12 because -- if I said it, it's because this was a
13 treatment case.

14 This was a case where -- and I remember
15 doing things like that, again not so much with you,
16 but with another kid, a little -- probably he came
17 from Lafayette.

18 And he got in trouble with the law only
19 because he said some threatening things. And I think
20 either mom didn't and someone made mom push it. And I
21 remember having to go toe to toe with Magistrate Cole
22 saying, Look, this isn't about a bad kid getting good.
23 This is about a sick kid getting well.

24 And much to his chagrin, he honored that and
25 said, All right, Guys, then you better do some

1 treatment here or else I am going to throw him to
2 Platte. But what's the treatment plan?

3 And painstakingly we had to come up with a
4 treatment plan that -- and it -- it worked, so --

5 MS. SHOMO: Now -- but, I mean, you
6 remember, though, meeting with the guy, right?
7 Because, I mean, that's exactly what happened in my
8 case, too, was that we ended up -- let's see if I've
9 got the right page here. We ended up meeting with the
10 Dale Pugh guy, and --

11 MR. SHEARER: Was that his name?

12 MS. SHOMO: Yeah. That was the prosecutor's
13 name, although I didn't know that until I looked up
14 his bar number from this page. But ended up with that
15 agreement there, which had me basically required to --

16 MR. SHEARER: Be in current therapy, yeah.
17 Mental center hold.

18 MS. SHOMO: I mean, I definitely didn't ask
19 for that agreement. And I know my mom wasn't asking
20 for it, so I'm not sure how that happened.

21 MR. SHEARER: How this happened?

22 MS. SHOMO: Yeah. I mean, I don't know how
23 he even knew to put on Boulder County Mental Health
24 and everything.

25 MR. SHEARER: Can I see more of these?

1 MS. SHOMO: Let me give you a different
2 packet because this is pretty much the court case. I
3 don't have much else --

4 MR. SHEARER: Do you have any of my records,
5 by any chance?

6 MS. SHOMO: I do.

7 MR. SHEARER: Because I had to -- you know,
8 when you leave the mental health center, you
9 relinquish all access to such records, treatment
10 notes.

11 MS. SHOMO: Well, here are the records from
12 7/15 and 8-whatever. But, unfortunately, that doesn't
13 have the note about you meeting with us with the --

14 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

15 MS. SHOMO: -- D.A.

16 MR. SHEARER: But the good news is that it
17 will at least give me a -- that's me. That's my
18 signature. Okay.

19 MS. SHOMO: So that's definitely your
20 signature on that page?

21 MR. SHEARER: That's me. Okay.

22 MS. SHOMO: I just want to make sure I've
23 thoroughly reality-tested everything before I write my
24 letter.

25 MR. SHEARER: Oh, wow. Okay. So you

1 were -- okay. You did receive a ticket. And Jessica
2 Fry was on the case. Okay. I remember Jessica, real
3 tall -- remember her, a real tall social worker?

4 MS. SHOMO: I only met with her once, and
5 that was after the plea was already entered.

6 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

7 MS. SHOMO: She wasn't interested in my
8 desire to report child abuse at the time.

9 MR. SHEARER: Yeah. And, you know, it was
10 such a crazy time because your mom -- remember, your
11 mom fired me twice. If I didn't say -- if things
12 didn't go well -- you know, if I told her what she
13 needed to hear, not what she wanted to hear, I ended
14 up fired.

15 MS. SHOMO: So you ran into that, too.

16 MR. SHEARER: Oh, yeah.

17 MS. SHOMO: But you thought I was paranoid
18 when I told you my mom was telling lies.

19 MR. SHEARER: No. Did I write that?

20 MS. SHOMO: Yes. It's all over your
21 records.

22 Let me just say one thing, Dan, because --
23 and this is something I wanted to ask about, because,
24 you know, you helped me quite a bit then, but you
25 never actually expressly told me you thought I was

1 paranoid. So I didn't know that until I went through
2 these records and found out that that was one of the
3 reasons that everything happened.

4 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Okay. Okay. But,
5 yeah, let's -- I'm seeing where you're reading. Okay.

6 So here's the sentence: Client sounded
7 rather paranoid as in the past of his mother -- that
8 his mother -- you know, how his mother is trying to
9 ruin him when asked about . . .

10 Yet -- okay. So that's one that says
11 sounded paranoid. Okay? Show me another note, and I
12 want to just look at that, because I'll give you some
13 insight about clinical verbiage.

14 Okay. So I saw that one.

15 MS. SHOMO: Okay. Well, let's look at 4/11.
16 That one will actually do the trick, as well.

17 MR. SHEARER: Client sounded rather paranoid
18 about . . .

19 Okay. The good news -- there's good news.
20 Clinically speaking, I never said you were paranoid.
21 And I can always write a letter to that. You were
22 never paranoid. You sounded paranoid. You would
23 appear paranoid.

24 But given the fact that your mother did
25 hospitalize you several times, also with the fact that

1 I believe we were always concerned about your mom's
2 mental stability at the time, and she was -- tended to
3 awfulize things more than they really were.

4 MS. SHOMO: Yes.

5 MR. SHEARER: And I know when I tried to
6 bring this up to her attention, I would usually end up
7 getting fired. And Suzan would tell me, Danny, you're
8 going to probably have to find a way to, you know --

9 MS. SHOMO: Suzan?

10 MR. SHEARER: Suzan Enlow was one of the
11 supervisors at the time. Suzan Enlow. And Rhonda
12 Zoker Beaupre was the first supervisor on the case.
13 Suzan Enlow pretty much stayed throughout most the
14 time.

15 Stacy Kiser came in. I don't know if you
16 had already been discharged by the time Stacy had come
17 in, because I was only there about four and a half
18 years.

19 MS. SHOMO: And I don't know any of their
20 names. Pretty much you were my only contact with all
21 of that, you and Eliopulos.

22 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Ahh. I haven't seen
23 him in a long time. So when we -- what I'm saying --

24 MS. SHOMO: But, I mean, I remember that I
25 got arrested. I got taken away in handcuffs. They

1 said it wasn't an official arrest. They did some
2 weird thing where they didn't print me --

3 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

4 MS. SHOMO: -- but we ended up going to the
5 D.A., like, twice.

6 MR. SHEARER: Right.

7 MS. SHOMO: And the first time I went, I
8 told him to shove the piece of paper up his ass,
9 basically, and we walked out, because I insisted we
10 walk out.

11 And then the second time we went was on
12 September 10th. And basically it was two days before
13 the arraignment. And it was explained to me that I
14 pretty much needed to take a deal or I was going to
15 jail.

16 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

17 MS. SHOMO: Do you remember that? Because
18 I --

19 MR. SHEARER: Well, you know what
20 happened -- what was going to happen was that they
21 were going to take it to court. You weren't going to
22 go to jail because you hadn't been convicted of
23 anything. They were just going to move it over to
24 court.

25 All we tried -- because we're not lawyers,

1 you know. We try to tell the D.A., you know, and if
2 there was a defense attorney -- but apparently it
3 doesn't sound like there was one --

4 MS. SHOMO: I wasn't permitted one.

5 MR. SHEARER: Okay. And that was probably
6 because we were trying to tell the D.A., why would we
7 go to court? This is a mental health issue. This
8 isn't about crime. This is a mental health issue. It
9 always has been a mental health issue.

10 I just need -- if you guys can help me
11 maintain leverage, because I always need a young
12 person to have -- you know, if I have a baseball bat
13 or a 2-by-4 over, we'll call it Magistrate Cole or
14 Platte, to just remind a young person that I need you
15 to stay focused on what's in front of you. I need you
16 to stay focused on your treatment plan, and everything
17 is going to smoothe over, because if you don't, then
18 one of these things are going to go "whap" on your
19 head. Okay? But all that then --

20 MS. SHOMO: So is that why I had to enter
21 the guilty plea was for leverage?

22 MR. SHEARER: I don't know if you had to
23 enter a plea, because did you go to a court case?

24 MS. SHOMO: I went to court. I was required
25 to go to court, and I was required to plead guilty.

1 And I called you on September the 12th before the
2 arraignment, and I told you I didn't want to do it.

3 And your reply was, you can maintain. Don't
4 worry. You'll be able to do just fine.

5 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

6 MS. SHOMO: You even told me that a jury was
7 never going to believe me if I tried to go to trial.

8 MR. SHEARER: That could be possible. But
9 there's never been -- there hasn't been an adolescent
10 case at the time -- again, this is juvenile court.
11 Juvenile courts, we can go on a crime route or we can
12 go on a mental health route.

13 If the person is unwilling to go anywhere,
14 then we're going to have to go through the motions and
15 we're going to -- you know, Magistrate Cole, I
16 don't know -- again, I don't know how the law would
17 function. But the worst-case scenario is, yeah, they
18 could have arraigned you or sentenced you, and then
19 you would have had jail time.

20 MS. SHOMO: I had a deferred sentence.

21 MR. SHEARER: You had a deferred sentence.

22 MS. SHOMO: There was no jail time. Jail
23 time wasn't even a possibility in the case, actually.

24 MR. SHEARER: So the way the D.A. told it to
25 me, as I understand it, is that we can do this where

1 if he's willing to maintain treatment, you know --
2 and, again, they're telling us, you know, Mental
3 Health Center, because they're guiding us too, we just
4 want the kid to get treatment and to maintain
5 treatment.

6 We don't want to see this as he acted out
7 criminally, because him and mom together are not --
8 they don't do well. Okay?

9 So this wasn't just you, Aubrey. It was you
10 and your mom. And your mom -- you know, we did push
11 her to get her own -- I don't know if she ever got
12 counseling during that time. I don't recall.

13 MS. SHOMO: Now, did you push her to call
14 the police or to prosecute me?

15 MR. SHEARER: No.

16 MS. SHOMO: Because she claims you did.

17 MR. SHEARER: This was already done. I
18 think you guys had this altercation before, because
19 the police were already there.

20 MS. SHOMO: Well, there were two
21 altercations. There was one in April and one in July.

22 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

23 MS. SHOMO: And the one in April, you came
24 while it was happening -- or while it was over, but
25 the cops were there, because my mom called.

1 And the one in July, I had already been
2 arrested before we got ahold of anyone, and I was
3 already being prosecuted.

4 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

5 MS. SHOMO: And I made it clear to everyone,
6 including you, I wanted to plead not guilty and fight
7 it in court. And it was explained to me that that was
8 not wise.

9 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh. And --

10 MS. SHOMO: And I would like to understand
11 that, because --

12 MR. SHEARER: Well, it wasn't wise -- if I
13 said it wasn't wise, it wasn't wise in the sense of
14 I'm a therapist. And I'm trying to help you promote a
15 good mental health, ability to stay on task in school.
16 Weren't you in Broomfield High at this time?

17 MS. SHOMO: I had actually already
18 graduated. I ended up flunking out of CU shortly
19 after the arraignment.

20 MR. SHEARER: I'm still on the case at this
21 time? Because the last time -- you were at Broomfield
22 High the last time I --

23 MS. SHOMO: Well, remember, the case was
24 going to be discharged, and I don't think my mom
25 wanted it to be discharged, so she kept calling the

1 cops.

2 Remember -- the note, for instance, from
3 7/15 -- I'm sorry. I have something of an eidetic
4 memory, and I sometimes expect others to have the
5 same.

6 But let's see. Like even the note here,
7 client was supposed to discharge from FACT this month
8 because I had graduated high school.

9 MR. SHEARER: Client was supposed to
10 (indistinguishable remarks) remain available until
11 client is emancipated or their issues are resolved.
12 What year? 2001, right? Okay.

13 MS. SHOMO: I mean, just to confess an
14 honest passing thought, I almost worry if you're still
15 playing games with me because you keep using prefixes
16 like, "if I said that." It seems like you're trying
17 to not say anything, which I don't understand, but --

18 MR. SHEARER: I'm just trying to remember.
19 I'm coming back to, oh my gosh, '01. We're talking
20 about ten years ago.

21 MS. SHOMO: All I'm trying to do is put this
22 behind me and move on.

23 MR. SHEARER: Well, and, Aubrey, let me ask
24 the question: What can I do to help?

25 MS. SHOMO: Well, it would be helpful if --

1 well, I need to fully understand everything, though.

2 Do you remember anything at all? What do you

3 remember?

4 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

5 MS. SHOMO: Because you remember there was

6 the altercation in April and mom called.

7 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

8 MS. SHOMO: And you came out. And something

9 happened, and we ended up having a family therapy

10 session, and that was the end of that.

11 And then my mom kept beating me. And so I

12 finally, for the first time in my entire life, fought

13 back in July of 2001, after in April my mother had

14 just attacked me and then made a few random

15 accusations.

16 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

17 MS. SHOMO: And the cops were still going to

18 arrest her, but you intervened. Do you remember that?

19 MR. SHEARER: Intervened from her getting

20 arrested?

21 MS. SHOMO: Yes.

22 MR. SHEARER: By telling cops not to arrest

23 mom?

24 MS. SHOMO: That's correct.

25 MR. SHEARER: Oh, wow. I wasn't your

1 favorite fan of your mom now, okay, so I'm like --

2 MS. SHOMO: Do you mind if I show you one
3 more page from me?

4 MR. SHEARER: Please. Please do.

5 MS. SHOMO: This is also you, is it not?
6 That's the other notes page from April 11th.

7 My mom was going to be arrested. I was
8 going to be out of that house. Everything was going
9 to be fine. And then you showed up. I wouldn't have
10 ever been arrested for defending myself from an
11 abusive parent if that had not occurred.

12 I would really like to know -- because I'm
13 sure my mom lied out her ass to make that happen.

14 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

15 MS. SHOMO: But I would like to know what
16 was going on.

17 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Okay. So, Aubrey, you
18 know what it sounds like to me, that all I was trying
19 to do was probably keep anyone from getting arrested
20 and that, you know, maybe we can work this out.

21 All I can do -- because all I am -- in that
22 position, all I can do is advocate. I can't tell a
23 police officer what to do. So if I --

24 MS. SHOMO: I'm aware of that. I really
25 want to understand why you advocated my mom not get

1 arrested for attacking me on that day and then you
2 advocated I plead guilty to battery on another day,
3 because that agreement I showed you that requires me
4 to participate in treatment with Boulder County Mental
5 Health -- so clearly someone from Boulder County
6 Mental Health was involved in its negotiation because
7 you were at least aware that I was not interested in
8 treatment. I was trying to get the hell out of
9 treatment. Right?

10 MR. SHEARER: Yeah, yeah, you were. But I
11 thought we had a pretty good rapport, though, at the
12 time.

13 MS. SHOMO: I wasn't interested in
14 medication. By the way, ten years off medication.

15 MR. SHEARER: Really?

16 MS. SHOMO: Really.

17 MR. SHEARER: Good for you. Good for you.
18 This is a crazy time going on with --

19 MS. SHOMO: I would not have entered that
20 guilty plea if I weren't stuck living with my
21 mother --

22 MR. SHEARER: -- you were stuck --

23 MS. SHOMO: -- and if it weren't explained
24 to me that I had no choice.

25 MR. SHEARER: Well, that's for sure, because

1 if I recall at the time -- help me understand this,
2 but your relationship with your father whom your
3 brother was staying with most of the time, if I
4 recall --

5 MS. SHOMO: It had been utterly poisoned by
6 my mother.

7 MR. SHEARER: It was bad. Okay. So, yeah,
8 I think as a therapist, coming out there, after all
9 that was going on --

10 MS. SHOMO: I mean, were you aware at this
11 time that my mother was regularly abusing me and that
12 I was not defending myself? Because you said that you
13 thought it was mutual altercations.

14 But do you know on April 11th, I did not
15 strike my mother, not once. The most I did was put my
16 hands up. She stabbed me with a fork that day.

17 MR. SHEARER: Your mom would have said
18 something that would have tainted that story of
19 somehow always putting it -- your mom -- you even said
20 it best, though we probably wouldn't admit it in front
21 of you.

22 MS. SHOMO: You called me paranoid.

23 MR. SHEARER: No, no. I said you sound
24 paranoid. I can't ever call a person paranoid because
25 I don't want to -- I don't want to incriminate myself.

1 You sounded a little paranoid, but you also
2 used to say, my mom -- in fact, I'm surprised you
3 don't have the note. I must have wrote it several
4 times where you say, my mom has Münchhausen's by
5 proxy.

6 MS. SHOMO: So you were aware I kept saying
7 that?

8 MR. SHEARER: Yes.

9 MS. SHOMO: Now, let me show you another
10 note that I do have.

11 MR. SHEARER: Yes. And we would not -- it
12 sounds like --

13 MS. SHOMO: This is from September -- or, I
14 mean, from February, two months prior to the first
15 event, and then three months later was the second,
16 where I openly predicted that my mother was going to
17 start making accusations against me. And your
18 response was paranoid.

19 And the problem I'm running into is it seems
20 like there's a consistent story. Client sounded
21 paranoid; will ignore this. In April, client sounded
22 paranoid; will get mom out of jail free. In July,
23 client sounded paranoid; will make client enter a
24 guilty plea.

25 MR. SHEARER: Okay. If you need me to --

1 because that's not where we were going. We were not
2 trying to say, Hey, mom's fine; the kid's paranoid.

3 MS. SHOMO: I want to know what you were
4 trying to do, and I really want to know what happened
5 behind the scenes to make this work, because I have
6 the most overwhelming pile of evidence I was a
7 battered child who pled guilty to battering my mother.
8 And you have no idea what that does to you.

9 MR. SHEARER: Oh, Aubrey --

10 MS. SHOMO: And I did it because of the plea
11 agreement that you negotiated with Dale Pugh. And I
12 would like you to take responsibility for that because
13 I was required in court to confess to being a
14 batterer.

15 MR. SHEARER: You were only asked -- in my
16 recollection, you were only asked to, Hey, will you
17 follow what these guys -- stay in treatment.
18 Do what's -- it was never set up, and it was never --

19 MS. SHOMO: It was never set up to
20 incriminate me. It was just set up to compel me.

21 MR. SHEARER: Just to follow through with
22 treatment as written.

23 MS. SHOMO: But you did arrange that, at
24 least. You arranged for treatment.

25 MR. SHEARER: I think we wanted -- yeah. We

1 would say, this is a mental health case. This is not
2 a criminal case. We've got to get him away from here.
3 You know, I think that was probably --

4 MS. SHOMO: So why was I required to enter a
5 guilty plea, then?

6 MR. SHEARER: I don't know. That, I don't
7 know. I don't know why you would have to enter a
8 guilty versus saying, Hey --

9 MS. SHOMO: Well, I mean, I insisted it was
10 no contest because I wasn't about to speak the word
11 "guilty." But the truth is a no contest plea is a
12 guilty plea. We all know that for every purpose.

13 Jessica Fry, after that, if you recall --
14 tell me if you remember this conversation -- said that
15 I was basically on probation. And because of the
16 guilty plea, it was established that I was beating up
17 my mom and that that was what was going on.

18 Do you remember that? That was like the
19 last conversation with Jessica Fry before my mom
20 decided to change bad guys again?

21 MR. SHEARER: When about was that?

22 MS. SHOMO: That was in September. But
23 unfortunately I didn't bring the September notes
24 because September was the very last note. You
25 actually remarked in that note, quote, client seemed

1 rather pleased with the agreement, but --

2 Let me see if I can refresh your memory
3 because this, I hope, will help, because, of course, I
4 wasn't pleased. I was pissed as hell. But I get to a
5 point sometimes at the last utmost end of desperation
6 where all you can do is sort of smile. That's been
7 misread at least twice in my life.

8 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

9 MS. SHOMO: But here's the problem that I'm
10 running into is, okay, so the arrangement with the
11 D.A -- and the D.A. required me to complete treatment.
12 And then my mom decided I needed anger management.
13 And you decided I needed anger management, even though
14 that wasn't the deal that was made with the D.A. So
15 you tried to change the deal.

16 And at that point, you got fired. But you
17 still wrote me the letter a year later -- or wrote the
18 court the letter a year later so that the case got
19 discharged. But --

20 MR. SHEARER: Wait. I wrote a letter to
21 discharge the case?

22 MS. SHOMO: You wrote a letter -- or I mean
23 so that it got dismissed. You wrote a letter to the
24 Court saying I had been discharged from FACT and
25 treatment through September 2001, and that was it.

1 But, I mean, what I'm trying to get there is
2 sort of what was going on, because all I knew is my
3 mom told me that you were arranging everything with
4 the D.A. I tried to tell everyone that what I wanted
5 was a fair trial because my mom was lying out her
6 butt.

7 And everybody else arranged this complicated
8 mental health thing, which required me to plead guilty
9 and accept the treatment I didn't want. And you
10 wanted the leverage. So I think you're at least
11 partially morally culpable there, and you're the one
12 who told me to take the deal.

13 I walked out. I mean, you remember you told
14 me to take the deal.

15 MR. SHEARER: I most likely said -- I said,
16 Aubrey -- or I said, Justin at the time, take the
17 deal.

18 MS. SHOMO: You said that.

19 MR. SHEARER: Because I would have --

20 MS. SHOMO: You said it.

21 MR. SHEARER: I would have said something
22 like that just because we're talking about --
23 because -- well, hey, I'm not looking ten years from
24 now. I'm looking at, I don't want you in any more
25 trouble. Mom -- I mean, I've got my hands full trying

1 to keep her at bay because she's going to change her
2 story.

3 Look, she was a sick woman, always looking
4 at you as the main problem, never focusing on her own
5 stuff.

6 MS. SHOMO: That's quite correct.

7 MR. SHEARER: Okay. And so the only way
8 that we can have two people, you know --

9 MS. SHOMO: Is if one of them utterly
10 surrenders, and it had to be me.

11 MR. SHEARER: Well, we didn't look at it
12 that way. We didn't see that you --

13 MS. SHOMO: It's what you accomplished.

14 MR. SHEARER: That's not our intent. You
15 know, the treatment team, as we were walking through
16 this -- because I don't do -- I didn't do anything by
17 myself.

18 This was with our treatment team; you know,
19 all the people there, the FACT team. And we're
20 saying, how am I going to get this family -- because
21 the whole idea of the FACT team was, how can we keep a
22 family intact without them either, A, killing
23 themselves, you know, or throwing things at each
24 other?

25 How are we going to be able to pull this one

1 off because the odds were that I wasn't going to able
2 to accomplish squat; that you were going to probably
3 end up in a long-term hospital. Mom was just going to
4 be, you know, forever on her lonesome because she's
5 just too sick. And we prioritized trying to keep the
6 family intact.

7 MS. SHOMO: But I was reporting abuse. Why
8 were you trying to keep the family intact?

9 MR. SHEARER: You were describing the
10 fights, and you were describing the fights that --
11 now, let's go back to what's showing up in front of
12 the cops. All right?

13 I don't remember these guys and what our
14 conversation was like. But whenever a cop is there at
15 the house, and they see what's going on, it's up to
16 them to make the final call. You know, we shrinks can
17 only go in there and advocate some things.

18 MS. SHOMO: I know. I know it was totally a
19 coin flip that you were there to save my mom and you
20 weren't there to save me. There was a difference of
21 15 minutes.

22 MR. SHEARER: I was there -- oh, but it
23 wasn't about saving mom, never, because -- okay.

24 MS. SHOMO: You realize I would never have
25 been arrested if somebody had acknowledged my mom was

1 abusing me, instead of nobody is going to listen, your
2 only chance is to stop her yourself.

3 MR. SHEARER: It wasn't my intent to be
4 helping or saving mom because anything and everything
5 I did was -- and, again, my hope was just to help you
6 out.

7 MS. SHOMO: So how did I end up pleading
8 guilty to this?

9 MR. SHEARER: I don't know why it all
10 turned -- I don't know how it turned out that you and
11 only you were the bad guy. That really escapes me,
12 because the cops themselves --

13 MS. SHOMO: Because my mom is damn good at
14 what she does.

15 MR. SHEARER: The cops themselves said,
16 Danny, we can arrest her. As I wrote, you know we can
17 arrest this woman. Okay. You know, I don't know why
18 they decided not to charge or to get -- or summon your
19 mom.

20 I don't know why they said, let's just let
21 the kid do it because the kid is just going to go
22 through the juvenile system, but the juvenile system
23 is probably going to defer it anyway. And he's going
24 to stay in treatment, and it's all going to go away.

25 MS. SHOMO: So it was going to be a small

1 enough injustice, it was fine if people abused their
2 power?

3 MR. SHEARER: Not an abuse. Not an abuse.
4 It's just, look, if we -- now, let's just say they
5 decided to arrest mom. I don't know where the heck
6 you would end up. Probably some foster care or
7 something like that.

8 MS. SHOMO: Well, I was a little worried
9 about that because it probably would have been
10 therapeutic foster care, and I probably would not have
11 gotten across the line at my 18th birthday without
12 ending up in a conservatorship.

13 MR. SHEARER: It could have got ugly.

14 MS. SHOMO: I mean, in a way, it's almost
15 lucky it went this way instead of me getting Mled
16 because I had a way out. It was very, very difficult
17 to slide across my 18th birthday and not be owned, but
18 I pulled it off.

19 MR. SHEARER: It was a risk that I don't
20 know if --

21 MS. SHOMO: Do you at least remember --
22 because it seems like you're trying to not say
23 anything. And I can totally understand that, because
24 I wouldn't want to say anything that could get me in
25 trouble either.

1 And I don't -- you know, that's not what I'm
2 after here. But do you at least remember me telling
3 you repeatedly I didn't want to enter that plea?

4 MR. SHEARER: Yeah. I remember you were
5 against anything. You didn't like cops, period. You
6 didn't like anything that had to do with the legal
7 system, period.

8 MS. SHOMO: But wasn't I expressly clear
9 that I didn't want to waive my right to a fair trial;
10 that I didn't want to admit I was guilty of a crime I
11 wasn't?

12 MR. SHEARER: And I -- as we were told, you
13 weren't going to be, like, this guilty party to --
14 like this battery against mom. You were agreeing
15 that, Hey, if I do this treatment, you guys are saying
16 this thing is deferred, because that's what deferment
17 means.

18 MS. SHOMO: Well, that's a deferred
19 prosecution. A deferred judgment, you stay guilty
20 forever. It's just that the case gets dismissed.

21 Dale Pugh didn't exactly say that because
22 prosecutors never exactly say that. But he was very
23 clear that I had to enter a plea. And you were
24 sitting right there. And I remember having told you I
25 did not want to do that.

1 And you've already -- you admitted that,
2 yes, you said I needed to take the deal because
3 otherwise I was getting fucked. And I probably did
4 because my mom was going to burn me.

5 MR. SHEARER: She would have said you need
6 to be in some therapeutic community if you don't go
7 this route, or she would have made something else up
8 that would have made it sound like you're unlivable
9 with and you need a higher level of care.

10 MS. SHOMO: So, I mean, is that how I ended
11 up making this guilty plea? Is that how that ended up
12 getting arranged?

13 MR. SHEARER: It could very well be
14 possible. But, see, keep in mind, I'm not thinking --
15 I'm thinking my priority was to you, not to mom. We
16 didn't like each other.

17 MS. SHOMO: But if your priority was me, why
18 did you keep telling me I needed to take a deal which
19 involved me pleading guilty?

20 MR. SHEARER: Because this kind of guilt was
21 something that nobody in my capacity could have ever
22 seen ten years from now going to find its way burning
23 you in the butt or sticking like it is sticking, or at
24 least you're saying -- and I trust you when you say,
25 Danny, this thing is going to rear its ugly head when

1 I --

2 MS. SHOMO: Repeatedly.

3 MR. SHEARER: -- am going to get -- like if
4 I want to get licensed in this state, this thing is
5 going to come up.

6 MS. SHOMO: Not in this state. In other
7 states.

8 MR. SHEARER: Because my understanding is
9 that what I was trained -- this is just part of my
10 training and part of my licensure, understanding
11 Colorado law, is that this nobody gets to hear.
12 Nobody gets to know.

13 So I'm a little confused right now that
14 you're saying -- but I trust you -- that somebody can
15 get this. Because we're thinking -- see, the whole
16 treatment team is thinking, nothing is going to happen
17 to Justin. Nothing. This thing is going to go away.
18 It's dead.

19 MS. SHOMO: So the whole treatment team was
20 part of deciding that the deferred judgment was the
21 way to conclude it?

22 MR. SHEARER: Because in our understanding
23 from the legal statutes at the time is that this
24 doesn't come and kill you -- because let's just say
25 you wanted to go into the military. They're not going

1 to know.

2 MS. SHOMO: Actually, they will. The case
3 where Bill Ritter pardoned someone who had a deferred
4 judgment, they were applying for military service, and
5 they weren't allowed in without a pardon.

6 MR. SHEARER: Because they had an
7 adolescent --

8 MS. SHOMO: A dismissed successfully
9 completed deferred judgment. I don't know if it was
10 adolescent. But the distinction between a juvenile
11 and an adult matter is very small now.

12 And I can assure you that many states
13 require you to openly disclose expunged records.

14 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

15 MS. SHOMO: And many states consider a
16 deferred judgment involves a guilty plea.

17 MR. SHEARER: We --

18 MS. SHOMO: That is a judicial confession or
19 an Alford Plea, which is as good as a judicial
20 confession.

21 MR. SHEARER: Yet we were taught ten years
22 ago that whatever happens as an adolescent is sealed.

23 MS. SHOMO: Oh, it's sealed.

24 MR. SHEARER: And it's not like --

25 MS. SHOMO: When the police type my name

1 into the computer, it shows up Aubrey Shomo, batterer,
2 sealed. And that's really great that it says sealed
3 next to it. That's extra special.

4 MR. SHEARER: Okay. So --

5 MS. SHOMO: I got burned. I got really
6 screwed over.

7 MR. SHEARER: So what do we need to do?

8 MS. SHOMO: The reality needs to be
9 acknowledged.

10 MR. SHEARER: I would have no problem
11 writing a letter stating that this thing was never
12 intended to make you the guilty party. Mom was just
13 as guilty, if not more so, in the incident, okay, the
14 incident where I came in and spoke with the police.

15 MS. SHOMO: Well, there were two incidents
16 where you came in and spoke with the police. The
17 first one was April 11th. Let me -- this is my
18 brother's letter. It's two pages. You can also read
19 my father's letter after it if you wish.

20 MR. SHEARER: Am I reading just the --

21 MS. SHOMO: Well, the highlighted portions
22 are the useful ones.

23 MR. SHEARER: Right. Right. Okay.

24 MS. SHOMO: But so you were saying the
25 treatment team definitely knew it was a deferred

1 judgment and was down with that; that that was
2 arranged. And it was not arranged by me. It wasn't
3 requested by me. That was done by the treatment team.

4 MR. SHEARER: Didn't you say that we were
5 going to go -- we were of the understanding that this
6 was never going to be a harm to you in any way.

7 MS. SHOMO: And it was okay if I entered a
8 guilty plea, as long as it was never going to be
9 harmful.

10 MR. SHEARER: It was like the equivalent to
11 diversion, where a person is, you know -- for
12 juveniles, they have a thing called diversion. And if
13 you do X, Y, or Z, this case doesn't exist.

14 MS. SHOMO: But this was a deferred
15 sentence. It's a very different thing. So the
16 treatment team made the deal not understanding what it
17 was, and then it was communicated to me that I needed
18 to accept it.

19 And at least at one point you did expressly
20 say that you told me to accept it. You then in the
21 next sentence said, what I would have said was. And,
22 you know, I would really like it if you would in your
23 letter acknowledge that you told me to take the deal,
24 because part of the problem is everybody is telling me
25 I chose to plead guilty. That's on me.

1 And if you remember, I kept trying to avoid
2 that, but nobody would listen to me. And the only
3 reason I've been able to find in the records for why
4 nobody would listen is the word paranoid.

5 On a day where my mother stabbed me in the
6 arm with a fork, Boulder County Mental Health
7 interfered and stopped her from being arrested. On
8 the day where I, having been backed to the wall with
9 my ass on the bed, sitting, warned my mother first and
10 then struck her once and only once and then locked the
11 door and called the police. And this was after she
12 had assaulted me so much that there were bite marks,
13 visible scratches recorded by the cops.

14 Oh, and check this out. They even set it up
15 for a welfare placement, but when that went to Social
16 Services, I don't think that went anywhere.

17 So I had many injuries. My mother had a
18 single injury. And according to both of our
19 statements, the injury she received was the last of
20 the fight. Rather than following it up, I called the
21 cops.

22 Now, I understand my mom lied out her ass to
23 the cops, so the cops definitely didn't know that what
24 I had done was an act of self-defense so justified it
25 was according to police procedures.

1 MR. SHEARER: Who had the bite on the
2 forearm?

3 MS. SHOMO: That was me.

4 MR. SHEARER: Oh, you had it.

5 MS. SHOMO: Yes. And you were the one
6 telling me to plead guilty because you thought it
7 wouldn't be a big deal if I was forced into treatment,
8 which also gave my mother the absolute power to have
9 me convicted with a phone call. All she had to do was
10 report another crime, and I would get convicted.

11 And you know damn good and well if she
12 reported another crime, I would have gotten a defense
13 just as great as the one I got the first time around.
14 The prosecutor had set me up to be in jeopardy of
15 being instantly convicted of this crime if I did not
16 comply with treatment.

17 So, yes, you got your leverage. Boy, did
18 you get your leverage. And that's not okay, frankly.
19 I mean, I might as well say the word, you're being
20 careful enough. We're talking about unauthorized
21 practice of law here.

22 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

23 MS. SHOMO: And I don't care. All I want is
24 my pardon so I'm not guilty of being a person who
25 beats up my mother for the rest of my life. That's

1 all I want out of this. But you did a thing which
2 violates professional ethics, and I think you should
3 acknowledge that. And I think you should acknowledge
4 it in writing.

5 MR. SHEARER: Aubrey, you know, I'm willing
6 to help you out. All right? I'm sorry you had a mom
7 that was very sick and wooed us in certain ways to
8 manage her own agenda. We knew that she had this
9 Münchhausen's by proxy.

10 MS. SHOMO: And did you know that or did you
11 think I was paranoid?

12 MR. SHEARER: No. You would sound kind
13 of -- well, the thing is just sounding paranoid and
14 being paranoid are two different things. I only
15 wanted -- it's just that sometimes trying to get you
16 to stay focused or just to stay on task was hard to do
17 because, you know -- you had legitimate concern that
18 your mom was crazy enough to do the damndest of
19 things.

20 MS. SHOMO: Yes. I told you -- I mean, in
21 the emancipation thing, where you note that I sounded
22 like I didn't want to emancipate, I told you -- and
23 these are, again, your notes -- couldn't state it, he
24 could not emancipate. It's the highlighted portion.

25 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

1 MS. SHOMO: And I know my mom was doing a
2 bunch of messed up stuff. My mom was the one who did
3 all of the really wrong things. You were just getting
4 jerked around by her.

5 MR. SHEARER: Yeah.

6 MS. SHOMO: But, unfortunately, what the
7 D.A. got was, this was some kind of mutual fight. And
8 I'm not sure how he got that impression.

9 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

10 MS. SHOMO: Apparently, he talked to a lot
11 of folks from Boulder County Mental Health.
12 Apparently, he talked to a treatment team.

13 MR. SHEARER: Right. Right. But am I not
14 accurate when I said both client and mom appear afraid
15 of the prospect of living separately, and both seem
16 committed to living together until you turn 18?

17 MS. SHOMO: Well, my commitment came from
18 the fact that my mom made it clear to me exactly what
19 she could do to me if I attempted to emancipate.

20 That's why I was afraid to try it, which I
21 said above. And you followed up with the line, client
22 sounded rather paranoid. I mean, what were you making
23 of that?

24 MR. SHEARER: I -- you know, maybe there was
25 times where I just didn't think she was that sick, you

1 know. But I didn't want to say, I don't believe you.

2 And I'm not going to say on here in writing, I don't
3 believe my client.

4 MS. SHOMO: Is the reason that I ended up
5 stuck with this deal is because you didn't believe me?

6 MR. SHEARER: No, never. It was never meant
7 that I think my client is -- he's deceitful and that
8 he did this and he should be punished. No.

9 I have a very dysfunctional family. I have
10 to find a way to provide some sort of functionality to
11 keep them together until he's 18. What are my
12 parameters? What can I do?

13 Well, we were always taught that if we can
14 keep a person -- and, again, we have the --

15 MS. SHOMO: Would you like to see the piece
16 of paper where my mother is diagnosed with
17 Münchhausen's? Check out the date on this. It's
18 January 15th, 1997. That's two years before we met.
19 The highlighted portions are the good ones.

20 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

21 MS. SHOMO: That's the Spooner report. I
22 kept trying -- I kept telling you to try and get your
23 hands on a copy of that. Were you ever able to? I
24 know my mom tried to block you.

25 MR. SHEARER: She would have never allowed

1 us to see this. It's not that we didn't believe
2 her -- I mean, believe you. We saw it.

3 MS. SHOMO: Well, if you believed me, then
4 why?

5 MR. SHEARER: An altercation -- a blow-up
6 occurs. I'm kind of like the guy who hears -- I'm
7 practically in the position of having to go out there
8 and put a fire out. All right? I'm not out there --
9 I was never ever your mom's defense attorney or
10 finding a way to keep her -- hey, look --

11 MS. SHOMO: You acted like you were my
12 defense attorney. Boulder County Mental Health made
13 this deal.

14 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

15 MS. SHOMO: And I was told by someone on the
16 treatment team -- I'm sure you can say that much, no
17 matter how paranoid you are about me somehow repeating
18 it and you getting in trouble --

19 MR. SHEARER: Aubrey, I'm not -- you know, I
20 mean, this is a -- I'm not afraid of, you know --

21 MS. SHOMO: Then here in the privacy of this
22 room, tell me what's going on. And then maybe we
23 don't have to -- maybe your letter doesn't have to
24 acknowledge all of that.

25 If you're willing to talk about how my mom

1 was a liar, maybe all you need to do is say, We
2 thought mom was a liar, but this was the best that
3 could be arranged under the circumstances.

4 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

5 MS. SHOMO: So maybe don't reveal those
6 things in the letter, but in this room, just tell me
7 the truth.

8 MR. SHEARER: I'm trying to. I'm trying to.
9 But you're -- this thing -- everything that you have,
10 you have come in here -- I mean, you're very
11 knowledgeable because it's you. It's your case. So
12 obviously you're knowledgeable. And you're talking to
13 someone who hasn't thought this --

14 MS. SHOMO: In ten years, I know.

15 MR. SHEARER: -- in ten years. Okay? I'm
16 just barely trying to play catch up. I read something
17 in yellow and I go, oh shit, I did write that. Wow.
18 What do you know? I'm kind of in shock.

19 MS. SHOMO: And you at least remember that
20 there was a meeting with Dale Pugh with my mother, you
21 and me there, right?

22 MR. SHEARER: No, I don't, but that's not to
23 say it didn't happen because I know those things would
24 have happened. And I would have --

25 MS. SHOMO: So if it's in your records, it

1 would probably be accurate.

2 MR. SHEARER: Yes. If I wrote it, it
3 happened. Okay? If I didn't write it, it didn't
4 happen.

5 MS. SHOMO: Okay. I should have -- I
6 have --

7 MR. SHEARER: You have got to understand --

8 MS. SHOMO: Will you trust me? Let me ask:
9 Will you trust me? I didn't bring it in mostly
10 because I didn't want the statement that was probably
11 just like the paranoid statements, client seems rather
12 pleased with his outcome, because that just wasn't the
13 case.

14 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

15 MS. SHOMO: But there is a record dated
16 September that says you, me, and mom met with the D.A.
17 and came to a resolution. That piece of paper exists.
18 It's in my possession.

19 MR. SHEARER: Okay. So I want you
20 completely exonerated from this entire mess. It was
21 not supposed to ever go this way.

22 MS. SHOMO: I know. It was the best-laid
23 plans of mice and men.

24 MR. SHEARER: It was just, hey, we keep you
25 in the home. We keep mom at bay. You turn 18. You

1 leave.

2 MS. SHOMO: You do know that I limply
3 accepted numerous beatings after that because my mom
4 told me if I so much as raised my arms to stop her,
5 she would place a single phone call and I would be
6 convicted?

7 MR. SHEARER: You're saying that this
8 continued.

9 MS. SHOMO: Oh, yes, it continued.

10 MR. SHEARER: Where is she now?

11 MS. SHOMO: In Golden somewhere. I don't
12 really care. We don't speak.

13 MR. SHEARER: You don't speak? When is the
14 last time you had any contact with her?

15 MS. SHOMO: Four years.

16 MR. SHEARER: Oh. Geez. Nothing to you?

17 MS. SHOMO: Nothing at all.

18 MR. SHEARER: So she's still really sick?

19 MS. SHOMO: I wouldn't be surprised if she
20 didn't Münchhausen's-ate her cat after she ran out of
21 access to me. The cat definitely died, and she
22 definitely ended up in the hospital from it. I don't
23 know the rest.

24 MR. SHEARER: And your brother?

25 MS. SHOMO: My brother still speaks to her.

1 MR. SHEARER: Where is he now? Does he
2 reside in the state?

3 MS. SHOMO: He's a pilot now. Did you know
4 that? He was hospitalized by my mother twice. He's a
5 pilot now only because he was lucky enough to go live
6 with my dad, which meant that he could have his
7 diagnoses overturned as a child, which meant that the
8 FAA would let him fly a plane. They actually won't
9 let me fly a plane. Thank you, Dan.

10 MR. SHEARER: Why not?

11 MS. SHOMO: Something about my mental health
12 history. The FAA is really, really bigoted when it
13 comes to letting you get in a cockpit. My brother is
14 so lucky he has a career, thanks to my mother.

15 MR. SHEARER: Your mother did a lot of
16 damage.

17 MS. SHOMO: She did incredible amounts of
18 damage. But she didn't pull off this conviction
19 alone. And, yes, it's not a conviction. It was a
20 deferred judgment. But it was not a diversion.

21 I mean, who on the treatment team said that?
22 Because you were under that impression. You said
23 those very words to me, that it would be nothing. If
24 I just played along, everything would be fine because
25 it would all go away. And the alternative was me

1 trying to prove that my mother was a liar, which
2 wouldn't succeed. You said that.

3 MR. SHEARER: And this had to have come from
4 Dale.

5 MS. SHOMO: And who is Dale?

6 MR. SHEARER: The D.A., because he's telling
7 us -- because he has to instruct us because we're,
8 like -- again, hey, I'm not an attorney. You know,
9 I'm just a therapist. I'm trying to keep this family
10 intact. How can I do this?

11 MS. SHOMO: Now, did the treatment team meet
12 with Dale independent of, like, when me and my mother
13 were meeting with him? Because I never met with him
14 without you present. I was taken to his office twice.
15 You drove me.

16 MR. SHEARER: I think Jessica, Dale,
17 myself -- shoot. Because we would have treatment team
18 every week.

19 MS. SHOMO: And Dale Pugh got involved in
20 all that?

21 MR. SHEARER: He may have showed up on some
22 of these treatment team meetings, or we might have had
23 him in phone conferences. Jessica Fry would have been
24 involved in those meetings.

25 MS. SHOMO: So you were a part of setting up

1 the deal where the guilty plea was required, properly
2 involved, as a Social Services FACT team sort of
3 thing?

4 MR. SHEARER: Yeah. We would probably say
5 yeah. Hey, I've got a 3:00 appointment.

6 MS. SHOMO: Oh, dear.

7 MR. SHEARER: So we need to come up with
8 what's our next step. What do you need me to do?

9 MS. SHOMO: Well, what are you willing to
10 put in a letter? It would be very helpful if you were
11 willing to acknowledge that you did tell me I needed
12 to take the deal, because my mom was telling me to
13 talk to you, and I was telling you that I was being
14 beaten and wanted a trial. And I told Dale Pugh that,
15 too.

16 But the deal was arranged, and I wasn't part
17 of arranging it. I was just told what it was going to
18 be and that I had to play along or I was going to get
19 really screwed. And I would like you to acknowledge
20 that in writing.

21 MR. SHEARER: How about -- you have a lot of
22 my notes, because I have the -- you're asking someone
23 to come back ten years to retrack how this thing
24 plotted out, because, you know, I was there, but how
25 we did it and how it ended up being in this guilty

1 plea, I don't know how we got to that part because --

2 MS. SHOMO: Well, that happened right before
3 the arraignment when I kept refusing.

4 MR. SHEARER: You weren't -- because it
5 makes it sound -- to me, I'm getting the sense that
6 how you perceive this and how it's written is somehow
7 you're the bad guy.

8 MS. SHOMO: Well, that's exactly what Dale
9 Pugh believed. That's why he made me plead guilty.
10 And that's why you told me that I needed to take the
11 deal. And you said that.

12 MR. SHEARER: Dale -- again, I don't even
13 remember what the fricken guy even looks like.

14 MS. SHOMO: But you did tell me -- you would
15 tell any client, you acknowledge, that they needed to
16 take the deal. You spoke the words to me --

17 MR. SHEARER: If it was part of a treatment
18 team and if it was to stay focused on treatment --

19 MS. SHOMO: Well, I was getting discharged.

20 MR. SHEARER: Well, whatever -- because what
21 did it say? You just follow through with treatment.
22 Even if that said, well --

23 MS. SHOMO: Well, it just said you met
24 with -- it just said you and me and my mother met with
25 the D.A. It didn't say anything other than that. It

1 didn't say what the deal was or anything like that.

2 But I'm talking about the phone call that
3 there's no note of between you and me on
4 September 12th right before the arraignment. I called
5 you from CU. Remember I was walking around and out of
6 breath? Do you remember that? It was right after
7 9/11.

8 MR. SHEARER: Oh, geez.

9 MS. SHOMO: It was the day after 9/11. And
10 I was up at CU. And the arraignment was at, like,
11 5:30. And I called you, and I asked you -- you were
12 going to be at the arraignment and then you couldn't
13 be there.

14 And I told you I didn't want to enter the
15 guilty plea. And you helped reinforce that it was
16 necessary.

17 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

18 MS. SHOMO: And you're right. I can't prove
19 that from your records. I'm not trying to prove that.

20 MR. SHEARER: Aubrey, if I --

21 MS. SHOMO: I don't care about proving that.
22 I just want to be set free from this that I've carried
23 for so long.

24 MR. SHEARER: Okay. All right. So you are
25 now in a position that this can be pardoned.

1 MS. SHOMO: Yes.

2 MR. SHEARER: Okay. And are you already --
3 you have got a letter already set up?

4 MS. SHOMO: I'm making application for a
5 pardon based on a finding of innocence, which may
6 never have been done in Colorado before. But, hey,
7 that's really not going to stop me.

8 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh. I can say -- I can
9 say that the police told me, as written, that they
10 should be arresting the mom for this because you were
11 the one with the marks.

12 MS. SHOMO: Well, that was a different day.
13 This -- see --

14 MR. SHEARER: Is that what this is for?

15 MS. SHOMO: Well, this is part of the
16 pattern. That's the problem.

17 I mean, if you have a 3:00 and we can
18 continue this at some point later, I would be
19 perfectly willing to come back, if that's an option.

20 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Well, the problem with
21 that is -- do you have a time frame on this?

22 MS. SHOMO: The sooner the better.

23 MR. SHEARER: But, I mean, like, do you
24 have, like, a deadline date coming up where, you know,
25 in three weeks you need to have X done so that you

1 send it in or something like that?

2 The reason being -- here's why -- is that
3 I'm leaving -- I'm going on vacation next week, and
4 I'm going to be gone for two weeks.

5 MS. SHOMO: Out of state, right?

6 MR. SHEARER: Yes.

7 MS. SHOMO: Right here, Defendant shall
8 waive his right to speedy sentencing. Defendant --
9 the Court is requested to defer judgment and
10 sentencing. Defendant will -- let me see.

11 Somewhere -- it's really hard to find in
12 this actually. It's pretty complicated. But -- oh,
13 is conditioned upon Defendant pleading guilty to the
14 violations.

15 This is the actual agreement, which then
16 requires -- it says I have to plead guilty, and then
17 it says that I continue with mental health.

18 And if you look at my mother's affidavit,
19 she expressly states that -- somewhere -- legal
20 guardian, pursuant to a plea agreement, I was present
21 at the arraignment.

22 MR. SHEARER: What's this conflict of
23 interest stuff she's talking about?

24 MS. SHOMO: Well, she was required to sign
25 the paperwork. Her signature is on the plea

1 agreement.

2 If I had wanted to try and go to trial, it
3 would have been necessary for me to get -- to subpoena
4 all of the records to try and prove what I was talking
5 about with her signature on it.

6 So the biggest screw-up here isn't even
7 yours. It's that the Court let her be my guardian and
8 also the person accusing me and also had
9 Münchhausen's.

10 MR. SHEARER: Yeah. It's a fucked
11 situation.

12 MS. SHOMO: But you helped because you were
13 my only out, and you told me to enter the deal.

14 MR. SHEARER: Because I thought you could
15 get out. We just had to get you to 18 and get you out
16 of this --

17 MS. SHOMO: And that's why you told me to do
18 that?

19 MR. SHEARER: Just to get you away from her?
20 I probably would have said yes to that. She's that
21 sick, and you want me to corroborate -- I need to
22 stand in front of --

23 MS. SHOMO: I would like you to corroborate
24 that, yes.

25 MR. SHEARER: Yeah, I'll do that.

1 MS. SHOMO: You will do that?

2 MR. SHEARER: Aubrey, I know how sick your
3 mom was. I had to deal with her. It was a sick, sick
4 situation. It was the only way to get you out of this
5 mess, because then it would have been ugly if we would
6 have had her -- because she would have made some --

7 MS. SHOMO: Are you willing to write a
8 letter, then, that says basically three things:
9 First, my mother was very, very sick. That she made
10 stuff up. That I told you that she was making stuff
11 up, that she would make stuff up, well in advance, as
12 far back as February, first.

13 Second, that from your understanding, I was
14 not an aggressor. I was not even a mutual
15 participant. I was a child getting my ass kicked.

16 Third, that the treatment team was involved
17 in making this deal and that pressure was applied to
18 me by Boulder County Mental Health. You don't have to
19 take personal responsibility. I don't care.

20 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

21 MS. SHOMO: But pressure was applied to me
22 by the organization you worked for that said I needed
23 to take this deal.

24 So basically I was SOL, no due process,
25 convicted, signed, stamped, and sealed.

1 MR. SHEARER: But it didn't go like that.

2 It didn't go like we're going to get this kid and
3 we're going to screw him over.

4 MS. SHOMO: But you did make the deal.

5 MR. SHEARER: We were presented with an
6 option --

7 MS. SHOMO: And you pressured me to take the
8 option.

9 MR. SHEARER: Because we thought it was part
10 of the -- it would complement part of the treatment
11 plan of maintaining this family. As dysfunctional as
12 it was --

13 MS. SHOMO: And that was your reason?

14 MR. SHEARER: I think so. I think so. We
15 didn't want to see you in some therapeutic treatment
16 center or you somehow getting attached to the system
17 come 18. We were so close, you know. And I had every
18 intention that you were probably going to be the next
19 Bill Gates.

20 MS. SHOMO: On that topic, I was going to
21 just offer this as an answer to paranoia and also the
22 whole me being a narcissist claim. But I actually
23 pulled this off while I was stuck with my mom. It's
24 amazing what she'd let me do as long as I just let her
25 beat me whenever she wanted.

1 MR. SHEARER: That's amazing.

2 MS. SHOMO: But that whole time, she had the
3 ability to tell me she could call my investors. You
4 can keep that actually. I have many.

5 She told me she had the ability to call my
6 investors and tell them I had pled guilty to beating
7 her up, and that would have dried up everything.

8 And she told me that she could call the
9 police and speak a word, and I would be convicted of
10 that crime. And that is what a deferred judgment
11 means. It means if you get charged with another crime
12 that ends up in a conviction, you get convicted of
13 both. And since the first one was a set of false
14 allegations --

15 MR. SHEARER: So you're saying that she's --

16 MS. SHOMO: She used that.

17 MR. SHEARER: -- used it against you. And
18 that's not -- that was an abuse on her part because
19 that was never --

20 MS. SHOMO: That had nothing to do with you,
21 but you helped set it up, not understanding what was
22 going to be done with it by my mother.

23 I don't believe you had any idea what she
24 was going to do with it, but you did help set it up.
25 And that was a wrong thing.

1 MR. SHEARER: Anything to undo what your mom
2 used against you I'll find a way to put it on paper.
3 But I'm going to need --

4 MS. SHOMO: Please do.

5 MR. SHEARER: Well, I'm going to need --
6 well, obviously I'm going to need some time because
7 I'm not going to be --

8 MS. SHOMO: Understandable. Understandable.

9 MR. SHEARER: You know, getting married kind
10 of takes away from --

11 MS. SHOMO: Oh, you're getting married?

12 MR. SHEARER: Yeah.

13 MS. SHOMO: Congratulations.

14 MR. SHEARER: Thank you.

15 MS. SHOMO: But, I mean, Dan, you know and I
16 know that you pressured me to enter that plea because
17 you thought it was the best thing and it wasn't going
18 to hurt me.

19 MR. SHEARER: Right. Right.

20 MS. SHOMO: But it happened, and it was
21 wrong, and it does have a way to hurt me. So you owe
22 me some way to make it better. And you owe me an
23 acknowledgement that I was pressured by Boulder County
24 Mental Health from one side and my mother from the
25 other, and that was all the outs I had a chance of

1 having.

2 And I don't care how you write it so that
3 your ass isn't on the line. You owe me that
4 admission. You once told me you admired Bester. Be
5 Bester, but give me that admission.

6 Alfred Bester, Babylon 5? Because the truth
7 speaks for itself with enough evidence. And that's
8 all I'm trying to make here. I have absolutely no
9 interest in seeing you get fucked. I can't promise
10 the same for my mother. She probably would want to
11 fuck you hard. I don't care. All I want is an
12 adequate remedy.

13 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Let me -- let me see
14 what I can do. I would like -- I would like something
15 in writing of what the bullet points that you need.

16 MS. SHOMO: I can do that. And you can
17 actually hold onto that. You should also read my
18 statement, which makes it very clear exactly how not
19 guilty of the crime I was. It's all in there. And
20 that's the packet of evidence I set up for you.

21 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

22 MS. SHOMO: I just didn't want you reading
23 the wrong parts too early in the conversation because
24 I wasn't sure what that would do to your willingness
25 to be a part of this.

1 I don't want to see anything happen to you,
2 but you did something that was probably improper. And
3 that was pressuring me to take the deal.

4 MR. SHEARER: No. I don't think I did
5 anything improper because I have a high ethical
6 standard that I would never do anything.

7 MS. SHOMO: So was pressuring me to take the
8 deal then -- was that okay ethically; it was just that
9 you didn't understand that I was going to get screwed?

10 MR. SHEARER: That it was going to come to
11 this, that mom was going to abuse it, you know,
12 because --

13 MS. SHOMO: Well, what did you expect? She
14 had Münchhausen's. The whole reason I was in the
15 mental health system was because she knew that if you
16 combine on being sane in sane places with false
17 accusations -- I'm sure you're familiar with Rosenhan.

18 MR. SHEARER: Keep me posted on how far
19 you're getting along in terms of what you're going
20 to -- if it's even necessary, you know, for this.

21 MS. SHOMO: It's absolutely necessary.

22 MR. SHEARER: This is what -- and who --

23 MS. SHOMO: And I don't get to amend the
24 application.

25 MR. SHEARER: You don't get to what?

1 MS. SHOMO: I don't get to amend the
2 application. So it's necessary with the filing of the
3 application.

4 MR. SHEARER: It's a one-time shot is what
5 you're saying.

6 MS. SHOMO: Yes.

7 MR. SHEARER: It's a one-time shot.

8 MS. SHOMO: It's a one-time shot, and I have
9 to have everything ready before I say, let's start
10 major attack option 1. Because once we go to total
11 forces, there's no going back.

12 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

13 MS. SHOMO: And all I want is an appropriate
14 remedy which acknowledges that I am not guilty of this
15 heinous thing.

16 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

17 MS. SHOMO: And all I want is an
18 acknowledgment that I had absolutely no choice about
19 saying I was guilty.

20 MR. SHEARER: Let me make sure --

21 MS. SHOMO: Sorry.

22 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Let's reconvene. I'm
23 back on the 17th of this month -- or next month, that
24 is, and -- because if you can -- do you have my
25 business card?

1 MS. SHOMO: Uh-huh. Well, actually, no, I
2 don't have your current one.

3 MR. SHEARER: If you want to e-mail some
4 bullets -- actually, you know what? I'll give you
5 this one.

6 (Indistinguishable remarks.)

7 MR. SHEARER: Okay. That's got the . . .
8 I'll see if I can even -- if they even allow me to
9 even research this thing.

10 MS. SHOMO: I mean, I can send you the
11 records, but I wasn't allowed anything about or said
12 by my mom. They blacked that all out with black
13 lines.

14 MR. SHEARER: Oh, is that what the black is?

15 MS. SHOMO: I mean, the black in my
16 brother's letter was because there was one thing he
17 demanded my confidentiality about.

18 MR. SHEARER: Uh-huh.

19 MS. SHOMO: The black in all of your records
20 was the best copies I could get. And the handwritten
21 notes on the Spooner report are my father's because
22 he's just --

23 MR. SHEARER: Okay. All right. All right.
24 Because I'm going to have to -- I have to try to find
25 out what was -- what those black things said. And

1 (inaudible) your case.

2 MS. SHOMO: And you're willing to do that?

3 MR. SHEARER: I'm going to make some calls.

4 You know, it will take me some time, but I'm going to

5 make some calls. I don't know who is the records

6 people there now. But --

7 MS. SHOMO: It's very possible whoever you

8 speak to will not understand the issue in this case

9 regarding the legalities of it. It is very technical.

10 But I assure you it's present.

11 MR. SHEARER: Okay.

12 MS. SHOMO: Are you willing to accept that,

13 or do you need me to set up the legal argument for why

14 it's a problem?

15 MR. SHEARER: No.

16 MS. SHOMO: I can send you the papers.

17 MR. SHEARER: No, no, no. I'm going to --

18 I've got to find out what I can access. I haven't

19 been there in seven years. So I don't even know --

20 you know, you can ask me -- you know, give me a couple

21 of weeks because (inaudible) what happened and I'll

22 let you know. And then we can go a different angle,

23 or I'll just start writing with what I have and just

24 go with that.

25 MS. SHOMO: Yeah. I mean, all I'm after is

1 undoing it. That's all I care about. But I think it
2 will be important that it's acknowledged that this
3 wasn't me looking for a plea. This was something
4 being set up by BCMH.

5 MR. SHEARER: Okay. Very good.

6 MS. SHOMO: Thank you.

7 MR. SHEARER: All right.

8 (Long pause in the recording.)

9 MS. SHOMO: Let the record show Dan Shearer
10 fucked up at least twice and actually acknowledged
11 what he did. If his letter isn't satisfactory, these
12 recordings will take me to war.

13 Okay. (Inaudible) bus stop (inaudible) he
14 has another appointment, so I think I can stop the
15 recordings here.

16 Do you know what time it is?

17 (Indistinguishable remarks made.)

18 MS. SHOMO: So 1520 Juliet. Stopping the
19 recordings.
