Re: Request legislative review of DOJ failure to investigate civil rights complaints

Senator Casey,

We applaud your efforts to obtain information on the number and scope of guardianships across the country. However, those steps will not bring relief to persons who are denied due process in court, denied civil rights by their guardians, and denied protection of the laws by state and local law enforcement. Our comments below are limited to violations in California.

#### NO DUE PROCESS OF LAW IN PROBATE COURT

California's probate courts often do not follow California Probate Code. Due process is often denied. Alleged incapacitated persons are stripped of civil rights in conservatorship proceedings lasting just a few minutes. Often, the respondent is not allowed to attend the hearing. Court appointed counsel, if present, often does not represent the rights or wishes of the respondent. Court appointed counsel are uniquely positioned to inflame conflict, thus driving billable hours for themselves and all attorneys involved in a case.

### NO PROTECTION OF THE LAWS - LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

California's law enforcement often does not provide protection of the laws for seniors and persons with disabilities. Law enforcement is extremely reticent to investigate abuse by conservators or their agents.

In 2015, advocates reported that a young man with developmental disabilities was imprisoned and isolated since 2010. Santa Barbara County Sheriff declined to investigate, referring the crimes social services. (See attached letter from Sheriff Bill Brown.)

From 2014 to 2020, advocates attempted to report that an elderly woman was held prisoner and isolated since 2012. Oakland Police Department officers consistently refused to accept reports of the crimes. In 2020, Internal Affairs wrote that Oakland Police department does not accept elder abuse reports. (See attached letter from Lt. Clay Burch.)

For two decades in Riverside County, advocates reported abuse in a group home for children and adults with severe developmental disabilities. In 2020, Riverside County Sheriff's Department still relied on the attached 1987 elder abuse policy, a policy that does not comply with requirements in <a href="Penal Code 368.5">Penal Code 368.5</a>. In 2019, a 17-year-old girl died in the group home. In August

2021, the owners/operators of the group home were arrested for murder and for years of abuse, including years of sexually abusing of residents.

# NO PROTECTION OF THE LAWS - CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

In 2011, advocates reported that an elderly woman was kidnapped from her home, held prisoner, and isolated for over a year. A San Bernardino County Sheriff's Deputy aided the kidnappers. Without accepting any supporting documents, California DOJ responded that *none of their activities were criminal in nature*. (See 2011 letter from Investigative Auditor Yolanda Mills.) In 2013, advocates provided DOJ with evidence that the same woman was sexually assaulted in 2012 by a male caregiver, and the care facility management covered up the crimes. Supervising Deputy Attorney General Vincent DiCarlo responded that the 2013 sexual abuse complaint was investigated in 2011, and the investigation would not be re-opened.

#### NO PROTECTION OF THE LAWS - US DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

For years, advocates submitted civil rights complaints to US Department of Justice (DOJ). There has been no response to those complaints.

# **REQUESTS**

We recognize the federal government has no authority over state and local entities. We recognize the legislative branch has no authority over law enforcement, which resides in the executive branch.

The legislature is positioned to track US DOJ investigations and to report the results of those investigations. We request legislative staff be tasked with the following duties.

- 1. Investigate the status of 2015 2021 civil rights complaints submitted to US DOJ in cases that involve conservatorship or guardianship.
- 2. Track the status of new civil rights complaints submitted to US DOJ in cases that involve conservatorship or guardianship.
- 3. Report to the legislature and to the public within twelve months.

RE: Reporting Adult Abuse Per 15630 (e) WIC

Assembly Bill 3988 became law on September 10, 1986 and addresses reporting of abuse of elderly and dependent adults. AB 3988 amended 15620 (e) of the Welfare and Institutions Code requiring mandatory telephone reporting by adult protective services to law enforcement:

"An Adult Protective Services agency shall immediately or as soon as practically possible report by telephone to the law enforcement agency having jurisdiction over the case..., every known or suspected instance of physical abuse of an elder or dependent adult. A county adult protective services agency shall also send a written report thereof within 36 hours of receiving the information concerning the incident to each agency to which it is required to make a telephone report under this subdivision.

Only a written report, sent within 36 hours, shall be required in the case of types of elder and dependent adult abuse other than physical abuse".

When a violation or suspected violation occurs, adult protective services will be notifying the Department and making the required telephone report which includes giving the Department:

Name and title of the reporting party;

Victim's name, age, sex, address (street and city), telephone number, and present location of the victim, if different from home address and telephone number;

Type of abuse, ie., physical, sexual, neglect, etc.;

Type of medical care required;

Name and address of a family member or contact person.

The following Department procedures will be followed:

- 1. Receipt of a telephone notification:
  - a. Calls received on normal business lines should be referred to Central Dispatch.
  - b. Dispatch will take necessary "call back" information and refer the call to an on-duty field deputy.
  - c. Standard procedures will be followed as to issuing a file number for the station in whose jurisdiction the incident occurred.

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- 2. Contact with the reporting party:
  - a. The person taking the report will write a "narrative" report using Forms A & C.
  - b. The report must include:
    - (1) Reporting party
    - (2) Victim
    - (3) Type of abuse and extent of injuries
    - (4) Family or contact person address and phone number
  - c. The reporting party will be given the appropriate department business address to mail any forthcoming adult protective services reports.
- 3. Status of Initial Reports:
  - a. Reports will be Open/Continued for follow-up
  - b. Follow-up personnel will determine the extent of investigation required and disposition of the case.
